

COVENANT AFFIRMATIONS-NEW YEAR, NEW SERIES

What's nearly 140 years old, serves its constituency around the world, and owes its existence in part to a potato famine in Sweden?

The Evangelical Covenant Church (ECC) officially began its ministry as a denomination on February 20, 1885 as influences from Lutheran, Congregationalist, and Evangelical Free denominations helped in shaping Covenant theology. Its current denominational headquarters are in Chicago, it numbers nearly 900 congregations in North America, and more than half of the Covenant congregations were planted less than two dozen years ago. Its roots are in the Swedish national church and in the mid-1850s, some Swedes wanted to have small group Bible studies called conventicles in their homes. The Swedish national church said this was not allowed and there was protest; a potato famine in the country also had an effect on some of those people who were feeling religious persecution, as the U.S. offered free land to people willing to farm here through the Homestead Act of 1862.

As a result, a lot of Swedes began emigrating our way (900,000 in a 30-year period). More than a decade before the denomination came into being, a congregation in Swede Bend, IA began as a Swedish Mission Society – the original building still stands and is used by a Covenant camp. Early Covenant churches had actually begun with Lutheran affiliations of some sort. The Evangelical Covenant Church in Paxton, IL, where we had previously served a decade ago, had organized in 1878 after a group of folks were excommunicated from the local Lutheran church.

Since its beginnings, the Covenant has been a highly missional denomination – more than 75 years doing medical missions in the African nation of Congo have resulted in more than 200,000 attending Covenant churches in that country, for example. Along with Africa and North America, our mission sites include the continents of South America, Europe and Asia. Currently, the largest populations of churches in the U.S. can be found in Chicagoland, the Twin Cities in Minnesota, and California. We have over 90 in our Midwest Conference, comprised of CO, NE, IA, KS and MO congregations. As of a few years ago, more than half of Covenant churches were averaging 100 or less in Sunday attendance, but we have a congregation of over 20,000, as Life Church (started in Edmond, OK) has a host of satellite congregations after Rev. Craig Groeschel started the initial congregation out of his garage.

I have been a Covenanter since I was 5 in the Chicago area. At age 24, I traveled to more than 50 Covenant churches (a 29-state tour) over 10 months as part of the musical group Covenant Heartsong, which served as the catalyst for my considering full-time ministry. Serving congregations in California over an eight-year period gave me even more insights on the denomination. And there have been later ministry stops in Iowa, central Illinois, Ohio and now Nebraska.

When Mary and I both worked at Covenant Headquarters together from 2000-04, we gained great respect for how the denomination was being led and its overall values. I gleaned much from traveling with the denomination's president to conference annual meetings and sitting down with him to talk church growth strategies.

Mary was a two-year short-term missionary to Colombia and also spent time in Mexico helping organize mission trips with churches in the U.S. No denomination is perfect, but we're proud to have our pastoral credentialing from the Covenant, having both been ordained in 2007.

Stromsburg Covenant Church is going on 148 years as a Covenant congregation (organized in the spring of 1874) – so it may seem as if we **'know it all'** about our denomination. But even for established churches, the values we espouse are an ever-changing thing. In fact, the ECC has added a

Covenant Affirmation in the past decade to account for those changes. So I believe it will be helpful to give you a larger explanation about what the ECC espouses as a denomination.

This month and next, I will preach a six-week sermon series on Covenant affirmations, the primary values the ECC centers its ministry from.

- Week one (Jan. 9) will be a quick primer on Covenant Affirmations, focusing upon the *centrality of scripture* on the life of the Covenant (using Psalm 1 and 2 Timothy 3:14-17).
- Week two (Jan. 16) using the story of Nicodemus from John 3 we'll probe how our relationship with Jesus Christ ("the necessity of new birth") guides how we dialogue with each other as we discern God's will for the church and live for him each day.
- Week three (Jan. 23) using Matthew 25:31-46 we will focus on what it means to commit to *the whole mission of the church* and what that means for the ECC.
- Week four (Jan. 30) using Ephesians 2:11-22 we will discuss what it means when the Covenant says it is *"a fellowship of believers."*
- Week five (Feb. 6) using John 14:15-27 will probe into the idea that we affirm "*a conscious dependence on the Holy Spirit,*" and
- Week six (Feb. 13) using I Corinthians 12 we will affirm the idea that there's *freedom in Christ* to express your gifts a little differently than the person sitting next to you.

Please join us for these worship services – and bring a friend or two.




