A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

The Fourth of July brings back lots of memories for me. When I was 10, I got to pitch in the annual Little League game played that year in Alsip, IL, my hometown. Two years later, we bought our dog on the 4th, which was the Bicentennial year. I've attended any number of parades in Ohio, Illinois, and watched fireworks after seeing major league games on that day a handful of times, last year at Great American Ballpark in Cincinnati after a Red-White Sox contest.

I can't say I've always taken the time to recall WHY we celebrate the Fourth of July each year while I'm watching fireworks or eating burgers or enjoying a parade, however, which is why a few years ago I researched the archives of Thomas Jefferson via an internet site called <u>www.monticello.org</u>. Jefferson was the principle writer of the Declaration of Independence, one of five assigned to put it together. A few years earlier , he might've considered the document unnecessary, as the colonists in America and their mother country, Great Britain, had a conciliatory relationship that gave the colonies decent trading leverage and protection. Then Britain fell upon harder economic times, they taxed the colonies in a way that colonial leaders deemed unreasonable, and on June 7, 1776, a leader from Virginia named Richard Henry Lee convinced a prominent group of others that a declaration of independence was needed.

So here's Thomas Jefferson, tapped to be the guy that would write the most influential document the colonies would ever be printed, and it would have to be done quickly because the colonies were feeling the pressure of the British army that was being sent to enforce the new taxes. The Declaration of Independence was formally adopted (though not signed by all 56 signers until a month later) as British ships were out on the coast of New York. And once adopted, the document was printed post haste, so that the general public knew what was being decided; of course, we know that within a few months there was a full-scale battle going on and our freedom today is largely due to the blood and sweat of so many back in the late-1700s that helped solidify our nation.

Among the freedoms touted in the Declaration is the freedom of religion. Ironically, Thomas Jefferson was not

considered the most religious person among the colonial leadership, although he was likely more religious than given credit for. But while other teachings around religion were not always taken kindly by Jefferson, he had this to say about the teachings of Jesus:

"My opinion is that if nothing had ever been added to what flowed purely from his lips, the whole world would at this day have been Christian."

Back in the day there was this fad that went on for a while, with loads of folks wearing wrist bands adorned with the letters W.W.J.D. on them (What would Jesus do?) and I suppose there were many cynics that didn't think the wearers could actually aspire to that end and emulate Christ with any accuracy at all. Still, I wonder if perhaps (like Jefferson) we're all in need of taking a more poignant look at the teachings of Jesus to try and make our best effort to live more like him?
